Ethics, Empathy & Excellence: The Three Pillars of Medical Teaching

Across millennia, the physician has borne a dual identity: healer of the body and custodian of humane values. When Hippocrates first inscribed his oath, and when Charaka codified Ayurveda's ethical canon, they were already grappling with the tension between technical skill and moral duty. Centuries later, Sir William Osler reminded his students that "the good physician treats the disease, the great physician treats the patient who has the disease."

Today that tension has intensified. The twenty-first-century medical teacher must still perform clinical miracles, yet is also expected to negotiate high-technology workspaces, genomic data streams, artificial-intelligence dashboards, consumer-driven expectations, social-media scrutiny, climate-linked disease patterns and constrained public resources—all while mentoring learners whose attention is perpetually tugged by digital distractions and algorithmic shortcuts. Under such pressures, what anchors our vocation? I propose that Ethics, Empathy and Excellence remain the non-negotiable tripod on which our collective credibility stands. A tripod is stable because all three legs must be equally strong; lose even one and the structure topples:

- Ethics guides the right choice—protecting patient autonomy, research integrity and social justice even when no one is watching.
- Empathy guides the kind choice—transforming clinical encounters into human connections that comfort, motivate and heal.
- Excellence guides the best choice—demanding perpetual growth in knowledge, skill and innovation so that our decisions are not merely well-intentioned but also scientifically sound.

Together these pillars help us graduate physicians whom society can trust with its most precious asset—life itself. In an era when a single viral tweet can tarnish an institution and a single breakthrough can rewrite treatment paradigms, Ethics keeps us upright, Empathy keeps us humane, and Excellence pushes us forward. They are not ornamental ideals; they are survival essentials for a profession that must remain both deeply human and relentlessly progressive.



1 Ethics – The Bedrock of Trust

1.1 Historical Roots – A Living Lineage

Codes of medical conduct have travelled a long arc from the oath attributed to Hippocrates through the maxims of Charaka and the medieval Persian Adab al-Tabib, to modern covenants such as the Nürnberg Code (1947) and the Declaration of Helsinki. Their wording differs, yet the essence endures: first, do no harm; always act for the patient's good; treat knowledge as a public trust. In India, the Indian Medical Council (Professional Conduct, Etiquette and Ethics) Regulations 2002—now overseen by the National Medical Commission—translate these global ideals into enforceable standards. For teachers in Odisha's government colleges, institutional ethics committees and the State Medical Council provide additional oversight. Such scaffolding reminds us that the curriculum vitae is meaningless without a curriculum morum—the course of character.

1.2 Contemporary Ethical Domains for Teachers

Domain	Core Questions We Must Discuss with Learners	Ward-level Teaching Ideas
Autonomy & Consent	How do we respect patient choices in low-literacy settings?	Bedside "teach-back" demonstrations; multilingual consent forms.
Justice & Allocation	Who gets scarce ICU beds or costly biologics?	Mock triage drills; ethics rounds with faculty from public-health and law.
Research Integrity	How to avoid plagiarism and data manipulation?	Live peer-review workshops; student journal clubs dissecting retraction cases.
Digital Ethics	May we WhatsApp clinical images to consultants?	Framing guidelines; audit trainees' smartphone etiquette.

1.3 Teaching through Narrative

Didactic slides rarely change behaviour; stories do. When learners feel the weight of an ethical crossroads, the lesson imprints on long-term memory. Here are five proven narrative strategies that transform abstract principles into lived wisdom:

#	Strategy	Implementation Tips	Intended Impact
1	Ethical Time-outs	In grand rounds, pause at the point of decision and ask the team: "Are we acting in the most ethical way for <i>this</i> patient?" Allow a two-minute open forum before proceeding.	Normalises moral reflection under real-world time pressure.
2	Story Circles	Weekly small-group sessions where students recount personal clinical dilemmas. Peers deconstruct each story using the four-principles model (autonomy, beneficence, non-maleficence, justice).	Builds narrative competence, peer empathy, and structured reasoning.
3	Historical Re-enactments	Dramatise landmark cases—the Tuskegee Syphilis Study or the saga of Henrietta Lacks—with students role-playing researchers, patients, regulators and journalists.	Reveals systemic bias, power asymmetry, and the evolution of consent norms.
4	Narrative Medicine Journals	Require learners to keep a reflective diary: one patient story per week, focusing on feelings, ethical tension, and personal growth. Faculty provide narrative-focused feedback, not marks.	Enhances self-awareness and reduces compassion fatigue through structured reflection.

By weaving these narrative methods into everyday teaching, we ensure that ethics is not an occasional lecture but a continuous, emotionally resonant dialogue—one that prepares tomorrow's physicians to navigate moral complexity with confidence and compassion.

1.4 Overcoming Barriers

• Even the most elegantly crafted ethics curriculum can falter when real-world pressures intrude. Four recurrent obstacles demand frank acknowledgment and systematic counter-measures:

2 Empathy – The Heartbeat of Healing

2.1 Why Empathy Matters Scientifically

Modern neuroimaging confirms that empathic engagement activates the mirror-neuron system, enhancing diagnostic accuracy through subtle behavioural cues. Clinical trials show that when physicians communicate warmth and understanding, analgesic requirements, treatment adherence and patient satisfaction improve—all measurable outcomes.

2.2 Cultivating Empathy in a Crowded Curriculum

2.3 Role-modelling Empathy

- **Interdisciplinary Grand Rounds** – Invite nursing, physiotherapy and social-work colleagues to co-present cases, highlighting team empathy.

2.4 Empathy and Technology

As telemedicine, chatbots and AI diagnostics enter mainstream, the potential for empathy erosion grows. Faculty should lead students to:

- 1. Humanise Screens** – Use video consult platforms that preserve eye contact; schedule on-site follow-ups.
- 2. Augment, Don't Replace** – Present AI as a second opinion, not an authority.
- 3. Digital Storytelling** – Encourage patients to share illness narratives via safe online portals; discuss them in tutorials.

2.5 Safeguarding Empathy through Wellness

Empathy declines when caregivers are exhausted. Institutions must implement protected sleep hours, counselling services, and peer-support networks. Burnout is not a badge of honour; it is a signal that we are failing our learners and patients.

3 Excellence – The Pursuit of Perpetual Growth

3.1 Redefining Excellence

Excellence is often mislabelled as elitism. In academia, it simply means committing to the best attainable standards and then nudging them higher. It is iterative, evidence-seeking and humble.

3.2 Domains of Excellence for Medical Teachers

- 1. Pedagogical Mastery** – Beyond didactic lectures, embrace flipped classrooms, problem-based learning, and gamified quizzes.
- 2. Clinical Competence** – Keep guidelines updated; use audit-feedback to correct practice drift.
- 3. Research Rigor** – Form interdisciplinary clusters (medicine-engineering-social science) to address complex health problems; secure competitive grants; publish negative as well as positive findings.
- 4. Leadership & Advocacy** – Mentor younger faculty, lobby for policy that strengthens public health, and champion gender equity in academia.
- 5. Technological Adaptability** – Integrate simulation, virtual reality, and AI decision-support without compromising bedside skills.

3.3 Quality Improvement (QI) as a Teaching Tool

QI projects serve triple goals: better patient outcomes, cost containment, and mentored scholarship for learners. A typical cycle involves: Define ☒ Measure ☒ Analyse ☒ Improve ☒ Control. Embedding QI into undergraduate electives results in early competence and institutional gains. Case vignette An MBBS student group at SCB Medical College analysed prescription wait times. By streamlining pharmacy counters, they reduced average wait from 47 minutes to 18 minutes, improving Press-Ganey satisfaction scores and gaining a national student-research award.

3.4 Benchmarking and Accreditation

- **Internal Benchmarking** – Compare departments on objective metrics (hand-hygiene compliance, student feedback scores).
- **External Accreditation** – Use National Medical Commission (NMC) standards not as hurdles but as roadmaps for excellence.
- **Global Twinning** – Establish exchange programmes with institutions in other countries or states to spur innovation.

3.5 Harnessing Digital Catalysts

- 3. Lifelong Learning Contracts** – Faculty sign yearly CPD (Continuing Professional Development) agreements with measurable goals.

4 Interlocking the Pillars

Imagine a three-circle Venn diagram. In the overlapping centre lies the Ideal Medical Teacher. Each pairwise intersection reveals critical synergies:

- **Ethics + Empathy -> Trust:** Patients sense sincere moral intent delivered kindly.
- **Ethics + Excellence -> Credibility:** Sound decisions executed competently earn professional respect.
- **Empathy + Excellence -> Healing:** Technical brilliance suffused with compassion accelerates recovery.

Neglecting any pillar distorts the triangle, warping educational outputs. An empathic yet technically poor physician may comfort but misdiagnose; an excellent yet unethical one may publish but exploit; an ethical and excellent clinician who lacks empathy may cure but leave emotional scars.

5 Implementing the Pillars in Odisha's Medical Colleges

Odisha hosts a mosaic of state, central, private and emerging rural medical colleges. Contextual adaptation is key.

1. **Curricular Embedding** – Align NMC's AETCOM modules with local languages and socio-cultural cases (e.g., tribal health, cyclone disasters).
2. **Faculty-Development Hubs** – Each zonal medical college could host quarterly "3E Workshops" where senior educators mentor peers on innovative teaching and assessment aligned to Ethics, Empathy and Excellence.
3. **Collaborative Networks** – Create an OMTA Digital Commons—a repository of case vignettes, reflective essays, rubrics and QI templates open to all member colleges.
4. **Student-Led Chapters** – Encourage student councils to run community-immersion projects evaluated on 3E metrics.

5. **Policy Interface** – OMTA can lobby state health authorities to tie faculty promotions to demonstrable achievements in ethical leadership, empathic practice and educational excellence (using validated portfolios).

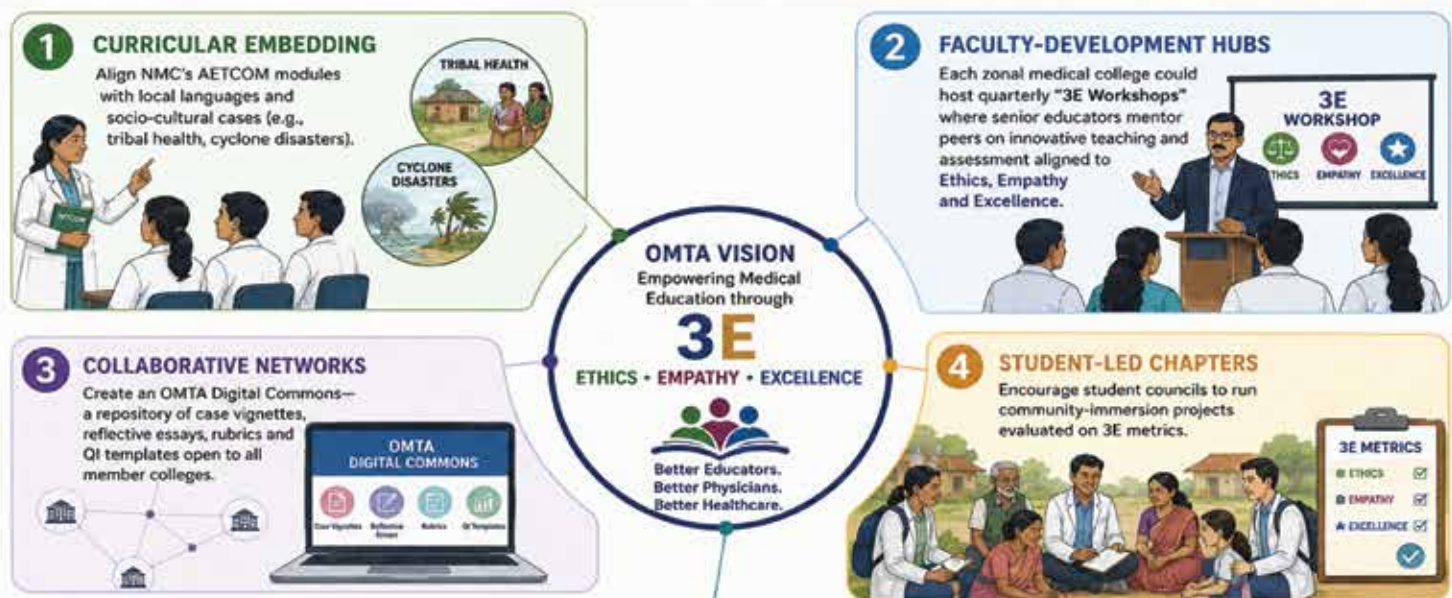
6 Vision for the Next Decade

The primary objectives of Social Skills Training are to enhance social functioning and improve overall quality of life. Specific objectives include:

- Improving verbal and non-verbal communication skills

INTRODUCTION

Social Skills Training (SST) is an important psychosocial intervention widely used in psychiatry to help individuals with mental illness develop effective interpersonal and communication skills. Many patients with psychiatric disorders experience significant difficulties in communication, forming and maintaining relationships, expressing emotions, and performing social roles. These challenges often interfere with rehabilitation, occupational functioning, and community reintegration. Social Skills Training addresses these deficits by teaching specific, practical skills through structured and systematic methods such as modelling, role play, feedback, reinforcement, and Behavioural rehearsal.

SST is grounded in Behavioural and cognitive-Behavioural principles, which emphasize that social behaviours can be learned, practiced, and improved over time. The primary goals of SST include improving communication skills, enhancing confidence and self-esteem, strengthening problem-solving abilities, and promoting independent living. It is widely applied in conditions such as schizophrenia, mood disorders, substance use disorders, autism spectrum disorder, and personality disorders. As a result, SST has become a key component of psychiatric rehabilitation and recovery-oriented mental health care.

HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT OF SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING

The development of Social Skills Training can be traced back to the 1960s, when Behavioural psychology and social learning theory began to influence mental health interventions. Albert Bandura's social learning theory highlighted the role of observation, imitation, and reinforcement in learning behaviour, forming the theoretical



rehabilitation, particularly for individuals with schizophrenia, who often exhibited deficits in communication and social functioning. Research during this period demonstrated that structured training could significantly improve social adjustment and community functioning.

Over time, SST has been integrated into hospital-based care, community mental health programs, and psychosocial rehabilitation services. Today, it is considered an evidence-based intervention that supports recovery, independence, and improved quality of life in individuals with mental illness.

- Teaching appropriate social behaviour in various situations
- Enhancing interpersonal relationships with family, friends, and society
- Developing assertiveness and the ability to express needs and feelings appropriately
- Improving problem-solving and decision-making skills
- Increasing self-confidence and self-esteem
- Reducing social withdrawal and isolation
- Promoting independent living and community functioning
- Supporting rehabilitation and long-term recovery

NEED FOR SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING

Social Skills Training is necessary because many individuals with mental illness experience deficits in communication, interaction, and coping skills. These deficits may exist before the onset of illness or may develop due to symptoms, prolonged hospitalization, or reduced social contact.

Common reasons highlighting the need for SST include:

1. Communication Difficulties

Patients may find it difficult to initiate or maintain conversations, listen effectively, or express emotions and needs clearly. Poor communication often leads to misunderstandings and interpersonal conflicts.

2. Social Withdrawal and Isolation

Conditions such as schizophrenia, depression, and anxiety disorders frequently result in avoidance of social situations, leading to loneliness and reduced social support.

3. Low Confidence and Self-Esteem

Repeated failures in social interactions and stigma associated with mental illness may reduce confidence and increase fear of social situations.

4. Interpersonal Relationship Problems

Patients may struggle to maintain relationships with family members, friends, or coworkers, affecting emotional well-being and recovery.

5. Poor Problem-Solving and Coping Skills

Difficulty handling everyday situations, such as resolving conflicts or making decisions, is common among individuals with psychiatric disorders.

6. Need for Rehabilitation and Community Adjustment

Successful rehabilitation requires skills for daily living, communication, and appropriate social behaviour.

7. Prevention of Relapse

Improved social functioning and stronger support systems promote treatment adherence and reduce stress, thereby lowering the risk of relapse.

Indications and Contraindications of SST

Indications

Social Skills Training is particularly useful in the following conditions:

- Schizophrenia and other severe mental disorders
- Social anxiety disorder and phobias
- Autism spectrum disorder (ASD)
- Attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD)
- Affective disorders such as depression
- Substance use disorders
- Individuals with specific deficits in communication, assertiveness, or conflict resolution

Contraindications and Limitations

- Acute psychosis or severe disorganization
 - Severe cognitive impairment
 - Lack of motivation or unwillingness to participate
 - Highly chaotic or unsupportive living environments
- These factors may reduce the effectiveness of SST and should be considered during assessment and planning

MODELS OF SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING

Several theoretical models guide the practice of SST:

1. Behavioural Model

This model emphasizes that social skills are learned behaviours that can be taught and reinforced. Techniques such as modelling, role play, feedback, and reinforcement are used to develop appropriate behaviours.

2. Social Learning Model

Based on Bandura's theory, this model highlights learning through observation and imitation. Patients observe demonstrations of appropriate behaviours and then practice the same skills.

3. Cognitive-Behavioural Model

This approach focuses on both thoughts and behaviours. Patients learn to identify and modify negative thoughts that interfere with social interaction, while also practicing appropriate responses.

4. Structured Skills Training Model

Developed by Robert Liberman, this model uses a step-by-step approach involving explanation, modelling, role play, feedback, reinforcement, and homework.



Principles of Social Skills Training

Effective SST follows several important principles:

- Individualization based on patient needs
- Structured and systematic training
- Modelling and demonstration
- Practice and repetition
- Feedback and positive reinforcement
- Gradual progression from simple to complex skills
- Generalization to real-life situations
- Active participation of patients
- Supportive and non-judgmental environment
- Continuity and follow-up

These principles ensure that training is meaningful, practical, and sustainable.

TECHNIQUES USED IN SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING

Several techniques are commonly used in SST:

Modelling

The therapist demonstrates appropriate behaviours, allowing patients to observe and learn.

Role Play

Patients practice social situations in a structured and safe environment, improving confidence and communication.

Behavioural Rehearsal

Repeated practice helps patients become comfortable and confident in performing specific skills.

Feedback

Constructive comments help patients recognize strengths and improve weaknesses.

Positive Reinforcement

Praise or rewards encourage repetition of desired behaviours.

Coaching and Prompting

Guidance and cues help patients perform skills correctly during practice.

Homework Assignments

Patients practice skills in real-life situations to generalize learning beyond therapy sessions

- Reduction in social withdrawal and isolation
- Better problem-solving and coping skills
- Improved relationships
- Better community functioning and independent living
- Improved treatment adherence
- Enhanced quality of life

These outcomes contribute significantly to psychosocial rehabilitation and long-term recovery

STRUCTURE OF SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING SESSIONS

A typical SST program includes the following sessions:

1. Introduction and assessment
2. Psychoeducation
3. Modelling
4. Role play and Behavioural rehearsal
5. Coaching and feedback
6. Homework and real-life practice
7. Review and generalization

This structured approach helps patients learn skills gradually and apply them effectively.

ASSESSMENT SCALES USED IN SST

Several standardized tools are used to assess social functioning and measure progress:

- The Behavioural, Emotional, and Social Skills Inventory (BESSI)
 - WHO Disability Assessment Schedule (WHODAS 2.0)
 - Vineland Social Maturity Scale (VSMS)
 - Indian Disability Evaluation and Assessment Scale (IDEAS)
 - BASIC-MR for children with intellectual disability
- These scales help clinicians identify deficits, plan interventions, and evaluate outcomes.



AREAS COVERED IN SOCIAL SKILLS TRAINING

SST focuses on a wide range of skill areas, including:

- Communication skills
- Non-verbal communication
- Assertiveness skills
- Interpersonal relationship skills
- Problem-solving and decision-making
- Emotional expression and control
- Community living skills such as shopping, transportation, and money management.

ROLE OF MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONALS

Mental health professionals play a crucial role in the planning and implementation of Social Skills Training. Their responsibilities include:

- Assessing social skill deficits and functional abilities
- Planning individualized training programs
- Teaching and demonstrating skills
- Conducting practice sessions
- Providing feedback and reinforcement
- Encouraging real-life practice
- Educating and involving family members
- Monitoring and evaluating progress
- Providing emotional support and motivation

A multidisciplinary team approach ensures comprehensive care and better outcomes.

The Talking Brain

A Gift from GOD only for homosapiens Without which we would be aphasic

The well accomplished gift from God to human beings only is the language area of brain having specialisation in language functions and skills. Equipped with this priceless tool of language mankind tries to govern the destiny of all the living creatures on earth.

language comprising of both expressive speech area and receptive speech area is a highly complex function keeping in order the required muscles, vocal organs, visual , auditory and other associated exteroceptive sensations.

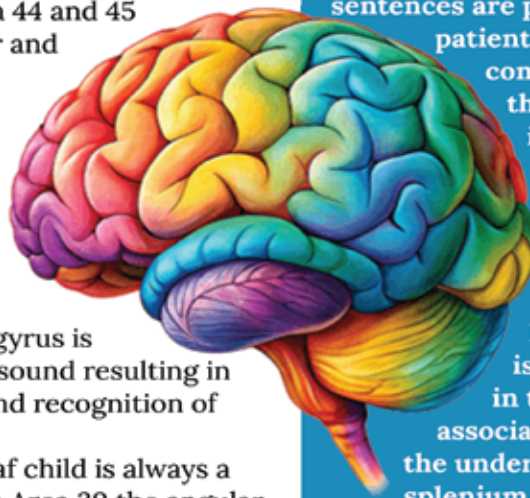
The expressive speech area also called as the motor speech area or Broca's area numbered as area 44 and 45 by Brodmann located in the opercular and triangular portion of inferior frontal gyrus Without the receptive language area the broca's area is not functional .This is also called as the sensory speech area comprising of auditory association cortex Wernicke's area or area 22, area 39 and area 40.

Area 22 located in superior temporal gyrus is concerned with the interpretation of sound resulting in comprehension of spoken language and recognition of familiar sounds and words.

To be more specific a congenitally deaf child is always a dumb child but the reverse is not true Area 39 the angular gyrus stores visual images and helps a child to recognise the objects by sight and speak about it as learnt and as per his or her mother tongue.

Area 40 the supramarginal gyrus recognises familiar objects and converts it into language with the help of touch and proprioception information such gathered after receiving inputs from hearing, seeing touching and proprioception sensation like vibration joint and muscle sense is processed in the posterior part of area 22 and thereafter projected to the Broca's area through the arcuate fasciculus.

Receptive aphasia – damage to left posterior superior temporal cortex Here there is difficulty in naming of objects and repetition of a sentence spoken by the person in front. There is defective auditory and visual comprehension of language Anomic aphasia - damage to left parietal lobe posterior to wernicke's area. This is characterised by circumlocutory speech but fluent along with word finding defects. Most patients with lesions in the left parietal lobe have difficulty with naming. Some patients cannot understand the words and sentences spoken by them but they can very well repeat what the examiner says and they can produce intelligible speech.

Transcortical aphasia - when the lesion affects the left middle temporal gyrus inferior to wernicke's area it is of receptive type. Expressive type affects the left frontal lobe anterior to Broca's area. Here there is difficulty in spontaneous speech but repetition of words and sentences are possible by the affected patients. Thus there is preservation of comprehension and repetition while they lose the ability of initiation as if they are tongue tied.

Alexia - loss of ability to read which is observed due to a lesion in the temporal or parietal lobe.

Pure alexia without agraphia - It is seen when the lesion is present in the left occipital lobe and associated commissural fibres either in the underlying white matter or in the splenium of corpus callosum. The connections are severed between the visual areas and the unilaterally located language area.
Dyslexia - This is a type of incomplete alexia characterised by inability to read more than a few lines with understanding. This is a common condition in children with normal intelligence. NMRI reveals the fact that some of the affected children lack the usual asymmetry in the size of planum temporale on the left and right sides of the cerebral cortex.

Expressive aphasia - Broca's aphasia - Characterised by hesitant and distorted speech with relatively good comprehension. A patient with Broca's aphasia can hear that he or she is talking irrelevantly whereas a patient with sensory aphasia talks fluently without being aware of failure of production of meaningful words.
Global aphasia - Complete loss of ability to communicate after destruction of cortex on both sides of the lateral sulcus. This is the most common consequence of occlusion or rupture of the middle cerebral artery which lies along the lateral sulcus or Sylvian fissure.

Conduction aphasia – This is observed due to lesion of left inferior parietal lobe, supramarginal gyrus and the underlying arcuate fasciculus. This is characterised by poor repetition of a sentence spoken by the examiner but with good comprehension and spontaneous speech.

Subcortical aphasia – This results due to affection of subcortical gray matter of the dominant hemisphere. There is impairment of language production and comprehension associated with dysarthria and contralateral hemiparesis. The lesion is most commonly located in the left thalamus or it involves the head of the left caudate nucleus because the Broca's area is functional on the left side of the cerebral hemisphere.

Aprosodia – lesion of right perisylvian area - frontal parietal, and temporal opercula. To conclude there is recovery of functions even in severe cases of aphasia within a time span of three to four months as much as time required for regeneration of the nerve cells after injury to the functional unit of the nervous system. However this is attributed to assumption of linguistic functions by the intact contralateral cerebral hemisphere. Therefore aphasia is a feature of left hemiplegic elderly patient while alexia and dyslexia are commonly found in children.

This was an attempt to compile different types of language and speech disorders keeping in view the different anatomical features of the cerebral hemisphere of left side either from birth or in due course of time and age of a person along with comorbid conditions affecting the blood circulation of the brain or ischaemia and atrophy.

4. Financial Strength = Institutional Strength

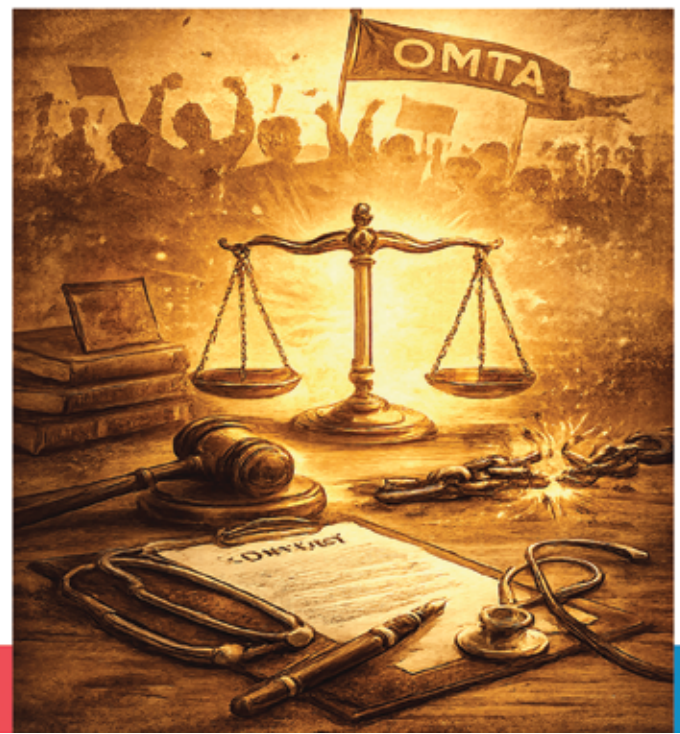
An organisation without financial stability cannot function effectively.

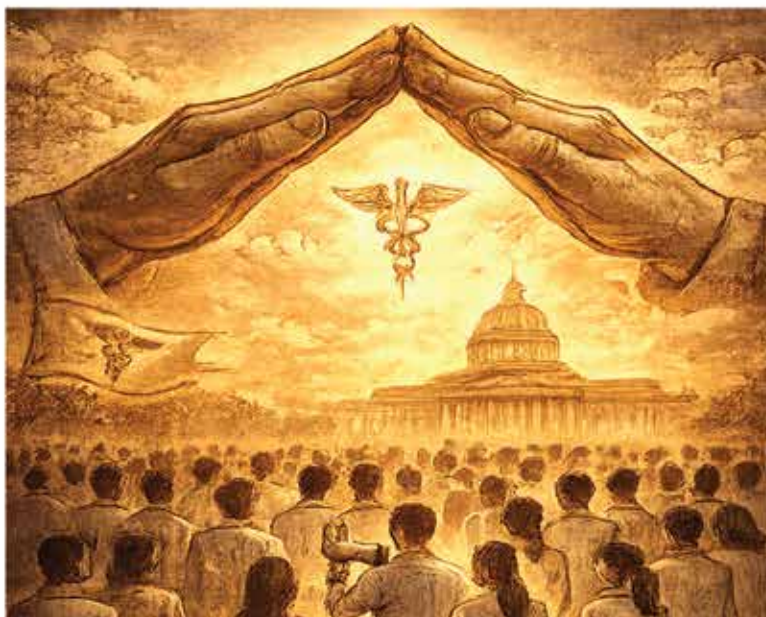

EARTH ON FIRE (PRALAYA)

According to Hindu mythology, the Earth was submerged deep inside the cosmic ocean during the Satya Yuga (also known as the Krita Yuga). The **Varaha Avatar**, the third incarnation of **Lord Vishnu**.

A powerful demon named **Hiranyaksha** kidnapped the Earth goddess, Bhudevi, and dragged her into the depths of the primordial cosmic ocean (Garbhodaka Ocean) to hide her.

To save the Earth, **Lord Vishnu** took the form of **Varaha**, a giant boar.

He dived into the deep waters, fought and defeated Hiranyaksha in a battle that reportedly lasted a thousand years, and finally lifted the Earth back to its proper place using his massive tusks. This took place in the current **Kalpa** (Day of Brahma) during the **Satya Yuga**.

The Varaha story is the primary one regarding the Earth being "hidden" in water, there are other times the world is submerged.

The **Matsya Avatar**: Near the end of a previous era, the world was submerged by a great flood (Pralaya). Lord Vishnu appeared as **Matsya** (the fish) to save the Vedas and the first man, Manu, by guiding a boat to safety.

The End of Every Yuga Cycle: At the end of every **Kali Yuga** and before the start of a new Satya Yuga, a partial dissolution often occurs where water covers much of the land before the world is "reset."

In Hindu cosmology, "fire on Earth" is most prominently associated with the end of a Yuga cycle or the end of a Kalpa (a Day of Brahma). While the Earth is submerged in water at the start of certain cycles (like the Varaha or Matsya stories), it is often consumed by fire at the end. The Fire of Dissolution (Pralaya) the most significant "fire on Earth" occurs during Pralaya, the period of dissolution. As a cycle ends, it is said that the sun's intensity increases many times over. Seven suns appear in the sky, drying up all the oceans and rivers.

The Samvartaka Fire: A fierce fire known as the Samvartaka or Yuga-fire breaks out, originating from the breath of Lord Shesha (the serpent upon whom Vishnu rests) or from the third eye of Lord Shiva (as Rudra).

This fire consumes the entire Earth and the three worlds (Bhu, Bhuvah, and Svah), turning everything to ash. Only after this intense heat does a century of heavy rain begin, submerging the charred Earth in water to "reset" the world for a new Satya Yuga.

Fire in the Kali Yuga (The Current Age)

The Kali Yuga (our current age), fire is often described as a tool of final destruction:

- **Kalki Avatar**: It is prophesied that at the very end of Kali Yuga, Lord Vishnu will appear as Kalki. While he is often depicted with a sword, the transition between the end of Kali Yuga and the start of the next Satya Yuga involves a "cleansing" by both fire and water to remove the darkness and sin of the previous age.

Scientific Perspective: The History of Fire

- **First Fire**: Large-scale wildfires first appeared about 470 million years ago during the Ordovician period, once land plants evolved enough to provide fuel and the atmosphere had enough oxygen.
- **Human Control**: Modern science suggests that human ancestors (Homo erectus) first began controlling fire roughly 1 million to 2 million years ago, using it for warmth, protection, and cooking.



In the Hindu context, the significance of fire in Kali Yuga (the current "Age of Darkness") is twofold: it represents a dying traditional practice and a transformative spiritual tool adapted for a more difficult era.

The Decline of Ritual Fire

Historically, fire (Agni) served as the primary medium for communicating with the divine through elaborate Yajnas (sacrificial rituals). However, in Kali Yuga, the efficacy of these fire rituals has significantly diminished:

- **Impurity of Performance:** Scriptural injunctions like the Srimad-Bhagavatam state that traditional fire sacrifices are often "full of smoke and doubts" today due to a lack of expert practitioners and pure ingredients.
- **Worship is "Dying Out":** Ancient texts prophesy that in this age, the worship of fire will gradually cease, as society focuses more on material survival than spiritual ceremony.

Fire as a Transformative Symbol
While physical rituals may be harder to perform correctly, fire remains a potent spiritual symbol and tool for purification in this age:

- **Burning of Sins:** It is believed that the "fire" of devotion—specifically the sight and touch of pure devotees or the chanting of holy names—can instantly burn away thousands of years of accumulated sins.
- **Inner Tapas (Heat):** Spiritual leaders like Sri M define Tapasya in Kali Yuga not as physical torture but as the "internal heat" generated by resisting one's impulses and distractions.

- **The Uncontaminable Element:** Fire is considered the eternal purifier because, unlike water or air, it cannot be contaminated; it only consumes and transforms, making it a vital symbol of hope in a "polluted" age
- In the modern Era fire extended further unpurposefully towards destruction of Life on earth ,the mind and habit of people attracts towards the fire lead to destruction of earth in form of Burning of waste ,burning of lands ,burning of forest,jungle etc. The ego of people increasing day by day ,and conflict among countries, states, districts and among each and every family and persons which caused due influence by kali yug. Internationally to village till common people all influenced by Kali leading to war between countries, burning from waste to forest lands leading to destruction of nature creating Air pollution ,global warming ,climatic changes, natural disaster.

Connection to the Divine Goddess Kali

The name "Kali" herself is etymologically linked to one of the seven tongues of fire. While Kali Yuga refers to the age of the demon Kali (conflict), the Goddess Kali is often depicted as the fire that warms the universe and destroys ego, offering protection to those who remain devoted during this dark age. As Summaried of Religious Efficacy related to key aspects and role in kaliyug, The physical Yajna Generally discouraged or considered "fruitless" due to improper execution. The Spiritual Fire represented by the "fire of chanting" (Sankirtana), which is the recommended "sacrifice" for this age,it Symbolise and represents a relentless truth that remains consistent ("fire burns") even as morals de

Lastly summarized the three yuga according to mythology that the Beginning of the Creation the earth a powerful demon named Hiranyaksha kidnapped the Earth goddess, Bhudevi, and dragged her into the depths of the primordial cosmic ocean (Garbhodaka Ocean) to hide her ,to save the Earth, Lord Vishnu took the form of Varaha, a giant boar,lifted the earth back it represents land person of earth. THE MAJESTIC RATNASIMHASANA OF SHREE MANDIRA

Since time immemorial the benevolent four deities, in their wooden manifestation appear on the holy Ratnasimhasana of Shree Mandira at Purusottama Kshetra and bless multitudes of devotees. The sacred seat or Simhasana, on which the mysterious four deities are worshipped, is known as Ratna Vedi, Ratna Mandapa, Antarvedi, Ratnasimhasana and Niladri Mandapa. This holy spot of Shree Mandira is the most sacred one.

In Utkalakhanda of the Skanda Purana, the significance of Antarvedi has been stated as follows:

“Purusottama Kshetra is the embodiment of Lord Vishnu and Antarvedi is like his heart”. In the Vanaparba of Mahabharata, Rishi Lomasha has stated before venerable Yudhisthira as per the following:

“O! Emperor, witness the altar-shaped land - mass that enjoins the sea. This landmass in shape of an altar touching the sea has emerged as per the request of the rishi Kashyapa. Those who climb the altar will verily become stalwart, lustrous & glorious”. The Pandavas climbed that Mahavedi as per the advice of Lomasha. According to legend and popular belief the said sacred seat is Niladri Mandapa.

As described in the Skanda Purana Sabara King Viswabasu and Gods from the heaven were the first to worship the deity Nilamadhava shining like the effulgence of blue emerald. This deity of eighty one angulas' height was found holding a conch, a disc, a mace and a lotus in his four hands. Further, as per the description in the said purana, after the mysterious disappearance of Nilamadhava, the wooden manifestation of Shree Balabhadra, Devi Subhadra, Shree Jagannatha and Shree Sudarshana appeared on the most sacred place i.e. on the Antarvedi, so famed as the most holy place of Lord Vishnu. The 4th chapter of the Skanda Purana describes as follows:

“As this Anatarvedi in the Purusottama Kshetra is extremely sacred, celestial bodies cherish a desire to remain here only. Here everyone feels privileged to have a glimpse of Lord Purusottama”.

According to different Puranic scriptures and shastras sacred Purusottama Kshetra is known as Shankha Kshetra. As per the Skanda Purana, Shree Kshetra is conch-shaped. The tip of the conch is coiled towards the south (Dakshinavartta Shankha).

The four principal deities appear on the bejewelled citadel which rests on the navel centre of the conch. Lord Brahma eulogised the wooden manifestations of Jagannatha, Balabhadra & Subhadra by chanting the Sama Veda, Rig Veda & Yajur Veda respectively. Lord Brahma himself consecrated the temple and enthroned the deities on



the Ratnasimhasana followed by a celestial bath of the mirrored reflections of the deities.

In accordance to Mahapurusha Vidya the sacred Simhasana of Lord Shree Jagannatha symbolises the Primordial Sound, AUM or Pranava. The assimilation of Simhasana and Pranava is unique. A full bloom Lotus is perceived on the pranavatmaka Simhasana. Hence, the ratnasimhasana is verily a lotus itself. Verse 32 of Chapter-9 of Mahapurusha vidya describes as follows: "In the conch-shaped Niladri upon the hundred petalled lotus shape of the Ratnasimhasana, I witness Lord Jagannatha decked in all exquisite adornments, resembling that of a newly formed child who is seated in the company of his elder brother Balabhadra, Sister Devi Subhadra on his right and Chakraraj Sudarshan on his left. Lord Jagannatha is being adored by Brahma, Rudra and Indra. I offer my benediction to this Lord, the Darubrahma, the essence of all the Vedas in the company of His dear associates".

The holy Ratnasimhasana has been constructed in the sanctum sanctorum of Shree Jagannatha Temple. The Saptavighraha (Seven Deities) such as Shree Jagannatha Shree Balabhadra, Devi Subhadra, Shree Sudarshana, Shree Devi, Bhudevi and Lord Madhava are enthroned and worshipped on the Ratnasimhasana. Out of the above seven deities the idols of both Bhudevi and Shree Devi are made up of metal. The idol of Shree Devi is made up of gold and hers in yellow colour. Similarly the idol of Bhudevi is made up of silver and hers is silver colour. Acharya Rajadev Paramahansa had installed the idols of Shree Devi and Bhudevi on the Ratnasimhasana in 1324AD.



In the past, statue of Adi Shankaracharya, Padmapadacharya and Kuttamma Chandi were also installed on the Ratnasimhasana. But subsequently due to the influence of religious leaders of Goudiya Vaishnava sect, these statues were removed from the Ratnasimhasana.

After analysing the stone inscriptions, scholars have opined that Anangabhimadeva III enthroned the deities on the bejewelled platform on his 18th regnal year in the solar month of Kumbha, the 10th lunar day of the bright fortnight, Thursday at the 14th danda (corresponding to 5hrs,36 minutes after the sunrise) in 1230AD.

According to Shilpa Shastra, it is believed that while consecrating temple valuable materials, gems and jewels etc. are kept under the sacred seat/altar. Scholars have opined that brahmashila, rarest of rare jewels, diamonds etc. are buried under the sacred seat/holy Simhasana of the Chaturdhamurtti (four deities). This is the reason for which the said sacred seat is not called as Simhasana but as "Ratnasimhasana".

As per the scholastic investigation of noted scholar Pandit Somanath Dash, several types of jewels were buried in different directions of the Ratnasimhasana. Bajra Heera (diamond), Pearl, Vaidurya, Vidruma, Sphatika, Indra Neela and Brahmaraga or Brahmahira were buried on the east, south, west, north, Agni Kona (South-east), Nairuta (South-West) and on the middle portion respectively. It has been constructed as per the prescriptive procedure of Shilpasastra and Tantra. Ratnasimhasana has been installed over Shree yantra. Some of the senior Palia servitors of the temple opine that the sacred Ratna Mandapa has been installed over one Lakh saligramas. Tara Yantra, Bhubaneswari Yantra and Shyama Yantra have been engraved on the Ratnasimhasana and Lord Balabhadra, Devi Subhadra and Lord Jagannatha have been installed on the said Yantras respectively. Bhairavi Chakra has been drawn beneath Ratnasimhasana.

It is known from history that the 12th century temple (Shree Mandira) and Ratnasimhasana have been attacked and destroyed by non-Hindu Kings many a time. According to historian Dr. S.N. Rajguru, Feroz Shah Tuglaq in 1360 has plundered Shree Jagannatha Temple during the reign of



King Bhanu Deva of Ganga Dynasty. Possibly the Ratnasimhasana was destroyed during that period and the three round stone blocks kept on the same were displaced. During the reign of the King Birakishor Dev of Bhoi dynasty the Ratnasimhasana was renovated and repaired. In 1955 Sri Paramananda Acharya, famous epigraphist and Dr. S.N. Rajguru had discovered some stone inscriptions and images in the Ratnasimhasana. Lucid and legible inscriptions found in the Ratnasimhasana speak of King Birakishor Dev and his grand mother (Thakura Maa). It is inscribed as follows: "E Birakishor Dev 'O' tanka Thakura Maa" (This is Birakishor Dev and his grand mother). It is evident that the present Ratnasimhasana was either renovated and repaired by Birakishor Dev or by the widow queen of Gajapati Gopinath Dev.

The Ratnasimhasana is located inside the sanctum sanctorum of the temple, As per the Record of Rights one rectangular wooden structure known as Kanka mundi has been fixed on the pillars of Ratnasimhasana. One multi-coloured applique is tied with the kanka mundi i.e. over the deities. The Ratnasimhasana is situated over Plot No. 1 as mentioned in the Record of Rights of Shree Jagannatha Temple. It has been constructed with black-granite. Three round shaped black-granite blocks are kept on the Ratnasimhasana. The height of the sanctum sanctorum of the main temple is 48 ft. and the breadth and length of the same is 30ft. each. The height length & breadth of the Ratnasimhasana is 4ft., 16ft, and 13ft. respectively. The said Simhasana faces towards the east. The bedha (Circumference) of the Ratnasimhasana is known as Mahavedi Bedha.

It has seven parts such as: Pindi, Kumbha Bandhi, Kanthi, Alasha, Stambha, Kanaka Mundai & Athargruhi. While the deities appear on the pindi of the Ratnasimhasana, round-Shaped brass plates known as Nabagrahabaitha are fixed to Kumbhabandi (the side wall of the Simhasana). Tulsi and flowers removed from the deities are kept on the side wall. The images of deities are gently tied (with silken robes and silver chains) with holes of the back side wall of the Simhasana. An applique is hung on the pillar and Kanaka Mundai of the Simhasana. A little space is available around the Ratnasimhasana and the devotees circumambulate the bejewelled platform.

While Shree Balabhadra, Shree Jagannatha and Devi Subhadra appear on the sacred pindis of the bejewelled platform, Shree Sudarshana and Shree Madhava appear on the left and backside of the deities respectively. Besides Sridevi appears on the left and Bhudevi on the right side of Shree Jagannatha. Certain rituals of the deities such as Avakasha (bathing ceremony), Sodha Vesha (Daily costume), Chandana lagi (application of sandal paste), Badasinghar Vesha are performed on the Ratnasimhasana regularly. It is said that gods from the heaven come down to Shree Mandira to witness the majestic Badasinghara Vesh i.e. adornment of deities with flowers.

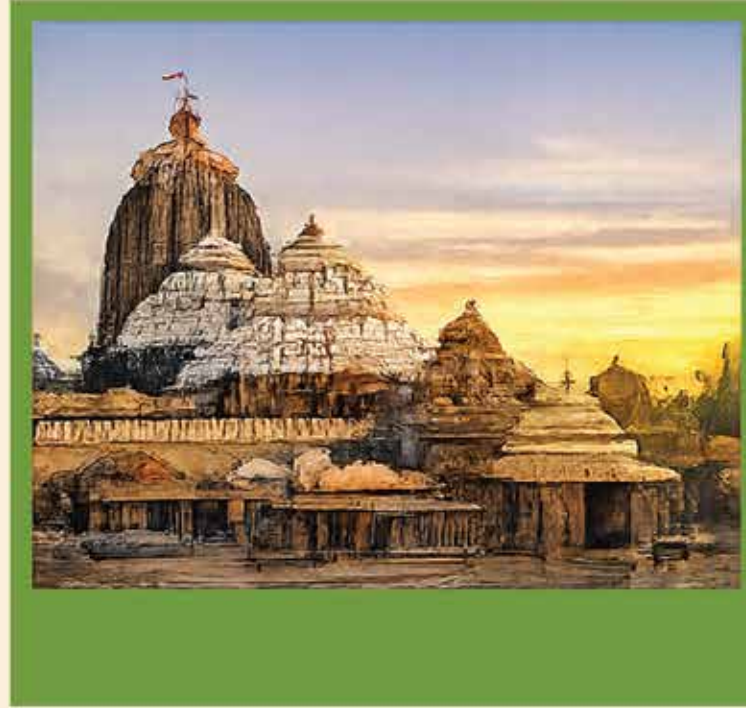
During the rituals and festivals, majestic Veshas of the deities on the Ratnasimhasana are performed. Following are some of the Veshas of the deities. Raja Vesha, Padma Vesha, Rahdha-Damodar Vesha, Krishna Balarama Vesha, Gaja Uddharana Vesha, Bankachuda Vesha, Tribikrama, Laxminarayana, Kaliaya Dalana, Banabhoji, Nabanka, Bamana Vesha, Raja rajeswari Vesha etc.

As described in the Mukti Chintamani, Ratnasimhasana is not moped with a broom as Salirgams are buried beneath the stone blocks of the same. While performing puja by servitors such as Puspalaka, Pujapanda, Bhittarchha, Talluchha, Mudiratha, Pati Mohapatra enough precautions are taken by them so that their feet will not come in contact with the round stone blocks. Besides, Daita & Datta Mohapatra concerned perform certain secret pujas on the Ratnasimhasana. Kotha Suansias and Darpania servitors on certain occasions perform the fixation of chara bandha and rundha rituals on the Ratnasimhasana respectively.

Gajapati Maharaja, the foremost servitor of the deities is not even allowed to climb the Ratnasimhasana. The King of Nepal, however, has the right to climb the Ratnasimhasana.



During the reign of Jajati, Vishnu-Shilas (Saligrama) having the symbols of Basudeva, Shankarshana and Suvarnagarbha were sent through Bharati Acharya by King of Nepal at the behest of Shankaracharya. This is the reason for which the King of Nepal has been enjoying exclusive prerogative to perform certain seva-Puja remaining on the Ratnasimhasana. It is to be mentioned here that the deities do not appear on the Ratnasimhasana from Snana Purnima till Niladribije. The deities appear on the Anabasara Pindi following the Snan Purnima (Celestial Bath) till Navajauvan darshana. During the Car-festival the deities appear on the Adapa Mandapa at Gundicha Temple so also on the chariots. After the daily Abakasha ritual (at morning time) thousands of devotees enter the sanctum sanctorum to get a glimpse of the saptadha murtti. Besides this, during Mangal Alati, Abakasha, Sandhya Alati, Chandana Lagi, etc. devotees are privileged to go near the Ratnasimhasana, after obtaining Parimanika tickets. Venerable Acharya, Saints, Pandits chant the following shloka by witnessing the four deities.



“

(I salute Shree Jagannatha, Shree Balabhadra, goddess Subhadra and Shree Sudarshana the Four Deities who appear as Daru Brahma (Brahma in the guise of wooden idols)).



The Architect of Second Chances: Breaking the Shell and the Cycle

Like the Phoenix you will rise from the ashes... . But the burning comes first! And for this part... you must be brave"



The journey from a self-imposed prison to a position of profound influence is rarely paved with luck. For many, the "shell" isn't just a metaphor for shyness; it is a fortress built from years of being overlooked, struggling without a safety net, and the heavy silence of untapped potential. To move from that quiet, joyless space into a life of dynamic impact requires two distinct, monumental shifts: breaking the shell and, more importantly, breaking the cycle.

Part I: Shattering the Comfort Zone

The first transformation is internal. Imagine a person who rarely smiles, whose voice is a whisper in a world of shouts, and who has had nothing handed to him. In this stage, the world feels like a spectator sport. The "shell" feels safe because it protects us from failure, but it also creates a vacuum where talent withers. Realizing one's potential begins with the uncomfortable decision to be seen. It starts with "striving for better" when no one is watching and seizing the thin, jagged opportunities that others might ignore. By aggressively pushing past the fear of the stage and the anxiety of assertion, the introvert discovers a hidden truth: confidence is a muscle, not a birthright. Through hard work and the grit of someone who knows the value of a hard-earned inch, a new personality emerges—one that is jovial, forgiving, and unafraid to lead.

Part II: Breaking the Cycle of Scarcity

The most dangerous trap for a self-made person is the "I had it hard, so you should too" mentality. This is the "cycle" that keeps potential locked away in others.

True growth is realized when the person who once struggled alone reaches the top and chooses to be a nurturer rather than a gatekeeper. Having known the sting of being ignored, this leader uses their position to:

Hand out the opportunities they never had. They understand that "earning it" doesn't mean you shouldn't be given a chance to try.

Aggressively advocate for talent. When they spot a spark in someone else—especially the quiet ones—they push them into the light, demanding they explore their limits.

The Legacy of the Just Leader

A leader who has broken their own shell becomes a "just" operator of power. They don't hoard their influence; they distribute it. They realize that their greatest talent isn't just their own skill, but their ability to see the latent greatness in others who are currently where they used to be.

By pushing others to be uncomfortable, they aren't being harsh. They are being empathetic. They know that the only way to find one's true North is to step out of the shade. Their story serves as a living blueprint: just because a door was closed for you, doesn't mean you shouldn't hold it open for the person behind you.

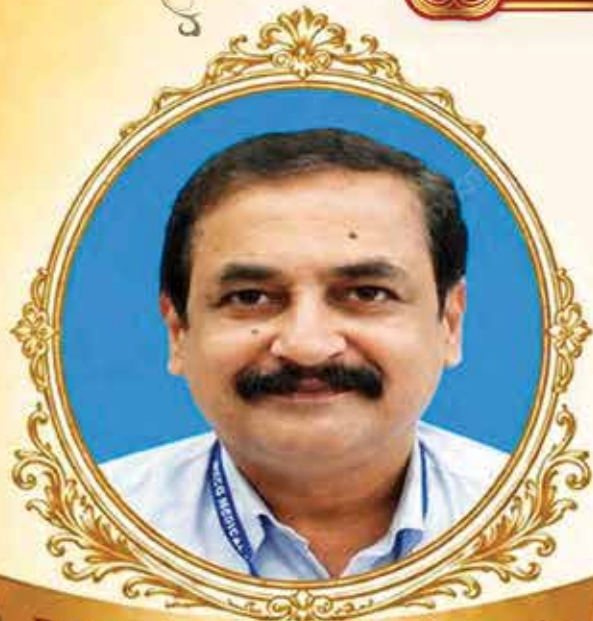

Sub: Grant of recognition to Orissa Medical College Teachers' Association

The undersigned is directed to say that Govt. have been pleased to recognize "Orissa Medical College Teachers' Association" subject to the following conditions.

1. The aim object and other activities "Orissa Medical Teachers" Association" shall conform to the rules as prescribed for the Association of Govt. Employees.
2. All correspondence and representation of OMTA shall be submitted to Secretary to Govt., H & F.W. Department through Director of Medical Education and Training who will receive deputation and representation to the affairs of the Association if any and/or allow the deputation to meet any other higher authority.
3. The Association should not offer dual membership nor allow any of their members to become a member of "Orissa Medical Service Association".
4. The General Secretary of the Association will furnish the names of the existing office bearers with the designation and the present official address, the date / dates of election of the office bearers along with relevant proceedings approved by the competent body of the Association and the change of address of the Office bearers as well as names and the addresses of all subsequent elected office bearers to the Govt. in Home (Association) Department.
5. A copy of the Bye Law of the Association is enclosed for their reference.

ODISHA MEDICAL COLLEGE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION

CONSTITUTION

(Revised upto _____ / _____ / _____)

The Odisha Medical College Teachers' Association shall consist of members whose names are on the register of the members of the Association at the time when these revised rules and bye-laws coming in operation and of subsequent members who shall be those persons who being eligible, shall after the date of adoption of these revised rules and bye-laws of the Association be duly elected in such manner and upon such condition as there be prescribed from time to time by the rules and bye-laws.

PART – 1

1. **NAME:** This Association shall be called the "ODISHA MEDICAL COLLEGE TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION" HEREIN AFTER REFERRED to as OMTA
2. **OFFICE:** The headquarters of the Association shall be at Cuttack and all correspondence should be made to the Secretary General at his place of posting (unless otherwise changed).
3. **Branches:** The OMTA shall have one branch for each State Government Medical college and the branch will be named after the respective Medical College.
4. **Objectives:** The objectives of OMTA shall be: -
 - (i) To protect the common interests of the members in relation to service
 - (ii) To maintain the honor, dignity, and interest of the medical profession.
 - (iii) To promote and advance the Medical Education and Research.
 - (iv) To improve the conditions and efficiency of service in the best interest of the suffering humanity.
 - (v) To publish journals and bulletins of scientific and professional interest to the Government.
 - (vi) To organize medical relief camps and health education campaign with the approval of the Government
 - (vii) To promote brotherly feeling among its own members
 - (viii) And to do such other activities as are congruent to the objective of the Association, individual and congruence to the attainment of the above objective.
5. **Membership:**
 - (i) **Eligibility:** The Membership of the Association shall be Open to Regular Medical/Dental College Teaching Doctors of State Government Institutions of Odisha, who belong to either OMES/VIMSAR cadre.
 - (ii) **Definition of Member:** An eligible member who had paid his/her one time Life Membership fees and has a valid OMTA Membership number.
 - (iii) **Duration of membership:** The membership of a medical college teacher is until he/she retires from Government service.
 - (iv) **Membership fee:** A one-time Life Membership fee of 5000 rupees (which shall increase by 1000 rupees every two years)
 - (v) **Rights and privileges of member:**
 - (a) Right to attend Association's G.B. Meeting, Conferences, Seminars and Workshops
 - (b) Every Member has the right to Vote and contest for any Official Post of the Association.
6. **Disqualification:** The followings shall make a member disqualified from the rights and privileges mentioned in Clause No. 5 above
 - (i) If expelled by General Body

- (ii) If unappropriated Association Funds.
- (iii) For misconduct bringing disreputation to the association and profession
- (iv) If dismissed / discharged from the Government Service and/or convicted by court of law for any criminal offences.

GENERAL BODY

7. The **General Body** of the Association is the supreme authority to take any decision in the interest of the Association.
8. **GENERAL BODY MEETINGS:**
 - (i)
 - (a) There shall be an Annual General Body Meeting to be held as and when proposed by the C.E.C.
 - (b) The place of Annual General Body Meeting shall be decided at least sixty days prior to the meeting and at least 30 days notice to be issued to all the Branches by the C.E.C. (Central Executive Committee).
 - (c) The General Body Meeting shall be hosted by one of the branches with the approval of the C.E.C.
 - (d) The General Body Meeting and Central Executive Committee Meeting shall be presided by the President or by any member to be nominated from among the members present in the meeting in absence of the President.
 - (ii) **Quorum:**
 - (a) One third of members shall form the quorum for the General Body Meeting.
 - (b) Annual General Body Meeting shall be adjourned due to lack of quorum and such adjourned meeting must be convened within one month. Members can Participate in the Annual GBM in online/offline mode/hybrid mode.
9. **POWERS OF GENERAL BODY:**
 - (i) To consider and pass the annual accounts and reports presented by the General Secretary.
 - (ii) To fix up or alter the Life membership fee.
 - (iii) To expel any member from the Association in conformity with Clause No. 6 subject to the recommendation of the C.E.C.
 - (iv) To elect the office bearers of C.E.C.
 - (v) To form any committee and sub-committee whenever necessary
 - (vi) To amend the constitution whenever necessary
(EXPLANATION: Amendment of the constitution can only be given effect if proposed two months earlier and intimated to all the branches and members and passed by ¾ of the members present at the General Body Meeting.
 - (vii) To discuss the proposals presented by C.E.C. / any branch / any member and take a decision.
 - (viii) To dissolve the C.E.C. or terminate the office or any office bearer of C.E.C. if moved and passed on a no confidence motion by ¾ majority.
 - (ix) To define and alter the policy of the Association.
 - (x) To dissolve the Association if passed by 3/4th majority members on roll.
10. **EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL BODY MEETING (E.G.B.)**
 - (i) An E.G.B. Meeting can be called on emergent circumstances by the C.E.C. to discuss specific matters. No matter other than the one specified can be discussed.
 - (ii) An E.G.B. Meeting can be called with a minimum of 15 days' notice. Notices shall be served to different branches and shall be published in official OMTA Social media groups.
 - (iii) **Quorum:** Minimum 50 members shall constitute the Quorum for such a meeting

(iv) For lack of Quorum the E.C.B. meeting can be adjourned for not more that forty-eight hours.

(v) Quorum shall not be necessary for such adjourned meeting.

11. REQUISITION GENERAL BODY MEETING (R.G.B.)

(i) A.G.B. Meeting can be called if requisitioned by not less than 100 members duly signed and to be sent to the Secretary with 30 days" notice on a specified issue.

(ii) Minimum ten members of C.E.C. can also requisition a R.G.B. Meeting with 30 days" notice on a specific issue.

(iii) Once a meeting is requisitioned in confirmation to the Clause 11(i) it can not be cancelled.

(iv) No other matter can be discussed in such meeting other the one for which the meeting is requisitioned.

(v) Quorum: Shall be 1/3 (one-third) of the total members.

(vi) The requisition meeting cannot be adjourned for lack of quorum and shall be treated as cancelled.

12. MANAGEMENT

The general control, management, direction of policies and affairs of the association shall be vested in a body styled as Central Executive Committee.

13. A. COMPOSITION OF CENTRAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE (C.E.C.)

- (i) President --- One
- (ii) Secretary General --- One
- (iii) Editor of Journal of Odisha Medical Colleges --- One
- (iv) All branch Secretaries & Presidents --- One from each Medical College
- (v) Treasurer --- One
- (vi) Members --- One nominated from each Medical College
- (vii) Invited Members --- Immediate Past State President & State Secretary General. One member each to be nominated by Current State President & Secretary General

13. B. TERM OF CENTRAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE (C.E.C.)

The term of the office bearers of the C.E.C. shall be for two years and they will hold office till such time as the successors will be elected. They shall be eligible for re-election, in no case the election of the office bearers of the C.E.C. be extended beyond 3 months from normal time. The same procedures shall be adopted in case of Branch Associations.

14. POWERS AND FUNCTIONS OF C.E.C.:

- (i) POWERS:
 - (a) It shall administer the affairs of the Association in accordance with the preparation of the constitution.
 - (b) It can take decisions in matters not covered by the provision of the Constitution to be ratified subsequently by the next General Body.
 - (c) It shall have the power to constitute committee, sub-committee to deal with different matters and can delegate all or some of its powers for particular purpose or purposes.
 - (d) It shall have powers to issue directives and instructions to the branches.

(ii) FUNCTIONS:

- (a) CEC meeting will be held once in every three months.
- (b) A CEC meeting should always be held before every General Body Meeting to discuss and finalize the agenda of the General Body Meeting.
- (c) C.E.C. shall take up matter / matters for discussion brought forward by a branch or by any member of the executive.
(EXPLANATION: Any matter sent by a member through their respective branches or by any member of the Executive, shall be discussed)
- (d) Extraordinary meeting of C.E.C. shall be held at one week notice. Ordinary meetings with one month notice.

Quorum: Minimum of one third members of CEC shall form the quorum. CEC meeting shall be adjourned for want of quorum and can be held without quorum after 1 hour in urgent situations and shall be called within 7 days in normal situation.

15. EMERGENCY C.E.C. MEETING:

- (i) Any emergency CEC meeting can be called with 48 hours' notice in consultation with the President or both the Vice-Presidents, or 5 members of the C.E.C.
- (ii) President or ten executive members can requisition an emergent CEC meeting and specific agenda for such emergent / requisitioned CEC meeting must be enclosed. Any member can be invited to the C.E.C. meeting, who shall have no voting right.

16. DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE OFFICE BEARERS:

(i) President:

- (a) The President shall preside over all CRC meetings, all General Body Meetings except such meetings which is specially requisitioned against the President.
- (b) Shall regulate the Proceedings of the meeting.
- (c) Shall guide and control the activities of the Association.
- (d) Shall interpret the provisions of the Constitution.
- (e) Shall have a casting vote in case of equality of votes.
- (f) Ruling of the President in a meeting shall be final.
- (g) Can speak in advance on behalf of the Association subject to the ratification by the C.E.C.

(ii) General Secretary:

- (a) Shall be in charge of all the records and documents of the Association.
- (b) Shall record all Proceedings in the minute book and take action on resolutions.
- (c) Shall be responsible for all correspondences including press communications in relation to the matter of the Association.
- (d) Shall spend money in the interest of the Association to a maximum of Rs. 10,000/- for a specific purpose, expenditure beyond Rs. 10,000/- for a specific purpose needs approval of the C.E.C.
- (e) Shall be responsible to present audited account before the General Body.
- (f) Shall call C.E.C. and General Body Meetings as per the provisions of the Constitution.
- (g) Shall be a member of every delegation.

- (h) Shall visit different branches for strengthening the organisation.
 - (i) Shall enter into any agreement on behalf of the Association, whenever necessary.
 - (j) Shall be empowered to sue and be liable to be sued on behalf of the Association.
 - (k) Shall furnish a list of office bearers with their present official address and copy of proceeding of General Body and Executive Body Meetings of the Association to Government, Home Department and Administrative Departments.
- (iii) **Editor of the Journal of O.M.T.A.:**
- (a) He will be responsible for collection of scientific articles from the members, periodical publication of OMTA Journal with the help of the managing Editor. He can reconstruct one member to the Board of Editors for Presidents Nomination.
 - (b) The Editor will be responsible to the Board of Editors and the C.E.C.
 - (c) He can open a separate account as „Journal fund“ for collection and transaction of OMTA Journal head. The transaction of money of this fund shall be done by the Treasurer and the Editor jointly.
- (iv) **Treasurer:**
- (a) He shall receive all funds (membership, grant donations, etc. directly or through others and any surplus money from Journal fund and will deposit to a nationalized bank in the name of O.M.T.A. (State) Account.
 - (b) He shall receive money as advertisement or donation for publication of OMTA journal directly or from the Editor and will deposit in a separate bank account as „Journal fund“.
 - (c) He shall maintain these accounts separately and maintain an Income and Expenditure Sheet of the Association and present the same in the CEC meeting every three months or earlier.
 - (d) He will give money to the Secretary General from the OMTA account and to the Editor from Journal fund when required on written requisition from them.
 - (e) He shall be responsible to get the accounts (both OMTA and Journal) audited by internal or external auditor or both, appointed by the President of the Association and present these two accounts in CEC and then in Annual G.B. Meeting for approval.
- (v) **Members of C.E.C.:**
- (a) Shall take part in the discussions and decisions of the CEC.
 - (b) Shall be responsible to put forth the important problems of the branches, before C.E.C.
 - (c) Shall be responsible for any work entrusted to him by C.E.C.
- (vi) **Branch Presidents & Secretaries** -Refer Part III, Clause 5 (A &B)
- 18. TERMINATION OF OFFICE:**
Any office bearer / C.E.C. member who remain absent from attending 3 consecutive meetings without sufficient reason shall automatically cease to be the member of the CEC.

19. FUNDS:

The funds of the Association constitute the membership fees, grants for Journals and donations received for the welfare of the Association. 30% of the collected amount from life Membership (LM) fees, for that financial year will be distributed amongst all the existing branches having Branch Account. Any donation collected by any member for the welfare of OMTA shall be given to the Treasurer within a week of collection. The Treasurer shall deposit the amount in the OMTA Bank Account within one week of collection.

20. THE ASSOCIATION YEAR:

The Association year both for CEC and branches shall be from 1st March to 28th February of the next year.

21. JOURNAL OF THE ASSOCIATION:

There shall be a Journal of the Association and shall be called as ORISSA JOURNAL OF MEDICAL COLLEGE and shall be managed by an Editorial Board constituting of five members of whom will be the Editor and another the Managing Editor elected by G.B. President of the Association on recommendation of Editor shall nominate one member to the Editorial Board. Three members shall be nominated by the CEC in its last meeting.

This journal will be published quarterly.

The Managing Editor will be responsible for collection of funds through donations, advertisements, or sole proceeds of the Journal. The Managing Editor is primarily responsible for timely publication of the Journal.

Fixation of price of the Journal will be done by the Editorial Board.

Editorial Board will be responsible to the CEC and the Managing Editor will present the accounts to the CEC one month prior to the annual General Body Meeting.

The funds of the Journal will be raised from advertisements, donations and sale proceeds. Deficit if any shall be borne by the Association.

PART – II PROCEDURES

1. PROCEDURE FOR ELECTION:

- a. Central Election Committee:
 - i. The CEC shall appoint an election committee which shall be called as Central Election Committee at least 90 days before the Election date.
 - ii. It shall have a convenor and two members who shall not be eligible to contest for any post of offices or CEC member.
 - iii. It shall conduct the election and announce the result of the election.
- b.
 - i. The Convenor shall call for nominations for the election of office bearers.
 - ii. The nominations will be filled by Regd. Post / or in person with the Convenor in prescribed form by 31st November or as decided by Central Election Committee.
- c. Eligibility of filling nomination:

Members who have paid their life Membership (LM) fees are eligible to contest for any post.
- d. The committee shall scrutinize the nomination by 15th of December or as is, decided by Central Election Committee and prepare the list of the eligible candidates and intimate the respective candidates and to all the branches by 25th December.
- e. The candidates can withdraw their nominations latest by 16th January in the prescribed form.
- f. The committee shall prepare the final list of candidates and intimate to all the branches

at least 21 days prior to the Annual GB Meeting.

- g. The Voting will be conducted by Neutral Organization, assigned by the CEC, through Secured, Personalized, Up-to-date Online process.
In case of a tie between the top two candidates, the result shall be decided by lot. The decision of the election committee shall be final.

2. AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION:

- a. The privilege of amending the Constitution is only vested with the General Body.
- b. Any proposal for amending the constitution can be brought by any member of the Association duly seconded and the proposal should be sent to the General Secretary, two months prior to the Annual General Body Meeting.
- c. While proposing the amendment, the existing clause and the proposed amendment should be mentioned.
- d. The proposal sent by the member shall be discussed thoroughly in the CEC meeting and the recommendation of the CEC along with the proposal shall be sent to all branches for their opinion and placed before General Body.
- e. Any amendment of the Constitution shall only be passed with $\frac{3}{4}$ majority of the members present.
- f. The amended clause shall be effective from the subsequent year unless otherwise decided by the General Body.
- g. No amendment to the provisions of the Constitution be made without approval of Government in Home Department.

3. VOTE OF NO CONFIDENCE:

- a. A vote of no confidence motion can only be brought against any office bearer mentioning specific charges duly signed by 100 members and to be sent to the General Secretary for circulation for circulation to all the branches and discussion in the CEC. (EXPLANATION: Specific charges:- misappropriation of Association fund, sabotaging in any manner in alignment of the objectives of the Association)
- b. Such motion can only be placed and discussed in a requisitioned General Body meeting to be called for by the General Secretary within 60 days on receipt of the motion.
- c. Such motion should be passed with 50% of the eligible members on the roll. (EXPLANATION: Eligible members are those who have voting rights)

4. ACCOUNTS:

All the books and records, such as cash book, receipt books, or any other documents relating to deposit and withdrawal of funds will be maintained by the Treasurer. These books and records are to be audited annually by an Auditor appointed by the CEC. The audited statement and the balance sheet shall be presented to general body in the Annual GB meeting. The funds of the Association will be deposited in a bank account decided by the CEC and the General Secretary plus Treasurer will operate the account.

5. TRAVELLING ALLOWANCES:

Members attending CEC meeting shall be paid actual fare (to and fro). CEC members and office bearers shall be paid from the funds of the Association by the General Secretary, members representing the branches shall get their TA from their respective branch Secretaries.

PART – III BRANCHES

1. The OMTA shall have one branch for each State Government Medical college and the branch will be named after the respective Medical College as enlisted in Part I, Clause 3
2. **OFFICE:** The office of the branch shall be in the respective medical college campus.
3. **Executive Body:** Each branch shall have an Executive Body which will constitute with the following:
 - i. President - One
 - ii. Vice-President - One
 - iii. Secretary - One
 - iv. Joint Secretary - One
 - v. Executive Members - Three
 - vi. Members to CEC - One
 - vii. Treasurer - One
 - viii. Editor - One

4. **Election:** All the above office bearers shall be elected by the Branch General Body from among the eligible members as per Clause 1-c of Part II, but election process will start in the same pattern one month after the State Election has been held.

(EXPLANATION: Representatives to the Central Executive Committee shall also be elected by the Branch General Body as per Clause 13 (ix).

These members to Central Executive Committee shall be ex-officio members to the Branch Executive Committee and shall communicate the deliberations of Central Executive Committee to their respective Branches.

If a Branch is unable to hold elections within two months of State elections, the decision regarding the Branch's Participation in CEC, for the ensuing session of OMTA shall lie entirely at the discretion of the State Office Bearers.

The Branch Election shall be held offline by secret ballot paper/ online process as per decision of the State G.B.M.

5. Powers of the Office Bearers:

A. President:

- i. Shall preside over the members of the Executive Committee and General Body of the Branch.
- ii. Shall give ruling on all constitutional matters.
- iii. Shall sign on all the resolutions to be placed to the Central Executive Committee. The decision of the President shall be final.

B. Secretary:

- i) Shall be responsible for all correspondences and activities.
- ii) Shall maintain the list of all members who have paid the dues and submit their names to the General Secretary of the Association at least by the end of June.
- iii) Shall be responsible to call the periodic meetings of the branch.
- iv) Shall communicate the decisions of the CEC to all the branches.
- v) Shall intimate the branch executive any communication received from the General Secretary.
- vi) Shall get the account of the branch audited once in a year and submit the report to the Central Executive Committee after getting it passed by the General Body of the Branch.
- vii) Shall conduct the election of the branch by secret ballot.

- viii) Shall spend money in the interest of the Association to a maximum of Rs. 5,000/- for a specific purpose, expenditure beyond Rs. 5,000/- for a specific purpose needs approval of the Executive Body.

C. Treasurer:

- i) Shall maintain account, received funds, disburse pending bills on instructions by Secretary in writing.
- ii) The Treasurer will send the income and expenditure statement to the Secretary General every three months interval to be discussed by C.E.C.

D. Joint Secretary:

- i) Shall assist the Secretary to discharge his duties.
- ii) Shall discharge all the duties of Secretary in his absence.
- iii) Shall be responsible for any work entrusted to him by the branch executive body.
- iv) Shall help in collection of membership fees or any donation or subscription and handover to the Treasurer within a week of collection.

E. Executive Members:

- i) Shall be responsible to attend the branch E.C. meetings and take part in the discussions.
- ii) Shall be responsible to put forth the important problems of the members.
- iii) Shall help in collection of Life membership fees or any donation from the members and hand over to the treasurer within a week of collection.

Funds: All Life Membership fees collected from members has to be deposited in the Bank Account of State OMTA within a week of collection by the Treasurer/Office Bearer. 30% of the collected amount from life Membership (LM) fees, for that financial year will be distributed amongst all the existing branches having Branch Account by State OMTA. Any donation collected by any member for the welfare of Branch OMTA shall be given to the Treasurer within a week of collection. The Treasurer shall deposit the amount in the Branch Bank Account within one week of collection. That fund can be utilized for the development of Branch with prior information to Secretary General, OMTA & approval of Executive Body.

Account of the Branch:

The Treasurer will receive all the subscriptions of the concern branch, he would maintain records of Income and Expenditure, to be audited by an Auditor or Auditors nominated by executive body or the Secretary. The Treasurer is responsible to present this audited report to the executive body and to get its approval after which this report to be presented to the General Body for its approval.

2. OBJECTIVES OF THE AWARD

- To recognize excellence in teaching and academic contribution.
- To encourage quality medical and dental education. & Healthcare
- To honour teachers contributing to patient care, research, mentoring, administration, institutional development and organisational growth.
- To promote academic leadership and ethical professional conduct.
- To ensure representation from different institutions, specialties and disciplines.

3. ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- 3.1 The applicant must be a valid Life Member of OMTA.
- 3.2 The applicant must register as a delegate for the concerned OMTACON.
- 3.3 The applicant must remain physically present during the award ceremony to receive the award.
- 3.4 In case of absence during the ceremony, the award may stand cancelled unless specifically exempted by the Central Executive Committee (CEC).
- 3.5 Applicants may be serving or retired faculty members from recognized Government Medical/Dental institutions of Odisha.

4. PRINCIPLES OF REPRESENTATION

- 4.1 Institutional Representation
Efforts shall be made to ensure that most Government Medical Colleges and Government Dental institutions receive representation in the awards over successive years.

6. SELECTION PROCESS

- 6.1 Member Participation Component
A proportion of awardees shall be selected through participation/voting by valid OMTA Life Members from among eligible applicants.
- 6.2 CEC Selection Component
A proportion of awardees shall be directly selected by the OMTA Central Executive Committee (CEC).
- 6.3 Selection Parameters
The following factors may be considered:
 - Teaching excellence
 - Academic contributions
 - Research and publications
 - Mentorship activities
 - Administrative leadership
 - Institutional service
 - Ethical and professional standing
 - Contributions towards OMTA, Health Care and medical education

7. NUMBER OF AWARDS

- The number of awards each year shall be decided by the CEC based upon:
- Number of valid applications
 - Merit and eligibility
 - Need for balanced representation
 - Administrative feasibility

8. NATURE OF THE AWARD

- Each awardee may receive:
- Citation/Certificate
 - Memento/Plaque
 - Public felicitation during OMTACON
- The design and format of the award may be modified by the CEC from time to time.

9. CODE OF CONDUCT

- 9.1 Any applicant providing false or misleading information shall be liable for disqualification.
- 9.2 The CEC reserves the right to withhold, defer or withdraw the award in exceptional circumstances involving professional misconduct or violation of OMTA ethics.

10. AUTHORITY AND FINAL DECISION

- The OMTA Central Executive Committee (CEC) shall be the final authority regarding:
